After an industry-wide call, the 25 works were exhibited at the first Moonlighting event. This year, for the fourth annual edition of Moonlighting, over 40 works were exhibited.

A sampling of works exhibited include:

# Top row above (left to right)

**Amer Maleh** (i2Systems) - The work questions the relationship between perception, and perspective. The sculpture represents a physical manifestation of this duality, exposing our construct and perception of reality, as it rests on our vantage point as the pivot point.

**Michael Benvenuto** (Brazill Lite Tech) - A bench made of found materials from an old warehouse tear-down near the waterfront in Jersey City. Wood and metal construction. Also, an art piece made of remaining material found from the site.

C. Brooke Silber (Jan & Brooke, Luminae) - Costumes for Halloween and dance competition - "Blue Dragon," "Poseidon," and "Girl on Fire."

## Second row above (left to right)

**Shoshanna Segal** (Luminous Flux) - "Quilted Building" examines what happens when we look at mock-ups as building blocks for art rather than as documentation?

**Jerry Kugler** (Kugler Ning Lighting) - Photos of shore birds in subdued light. The goal is to try to achieve in photography the Chiaroscuro lighting used by Renaissance painters.

**Saba Hamidi Coleman** (Tirschwell & Co) - These three pieces are from a series of nine that explore accounts from the Baha'i history at bicentenary of Baha'u'llah's birth.
